Laura Cox (R-Livonia) Tuesday, delivering the Republican-held Wayne County seat into Democratic hands. Unofficial results showed Ms. Polehanki having taken 51.6 percent of the vote to 46.2 percent for Ms. Cox, with all precincts reporting.</p> <p>What appeared to be a safe seat for Republicans at the beginning of the election cycle began to narrow in the final months, underscoring the spike in Democratic enthusiasm this year. Ms. Polehanki, who was still teaching full-time during the campaign, was able to turn a lean-Republican district blue amidst an expensive final stretch for both parties.</p> <p><b>MIRS Analysis</b> (November 6, 2018): House Appropriations Committee Chair Laura COX couldn't survive a bad environment for Republicans in western Wayne County and was defeated by Dayna POLEHANKI, a high school English teacher who also runs a television and film casting company.</p> <p>Cox, a former Wayne County commissioner, benefited from the endorsement of Democratic County Prosecutor Kym WORTHY and Executive Warren EVANS. Her campaign also attracted the largest amount of money in the General, with \$1.18 million coming her way.</p> <p>Meanwhile, the first-time candidate ran a text-book campaign that stuck to her traditional public education roots and made no mistakes. Her support for removing the profit motive in charter schools fell in line with what many in this Northville/Livonia district wanted to hear after eight years of being represented by hard-right Senator Patrick COLBECK (R-Canton).</p>

The Democrats tried to soften up MacDonald by playing up a 2007 drunk-driving accident that caused a motorcyclist to lose a leg.</p>

appears to have kept the 34th Senate District in the GOP column Tuesday and was expected to defeat Muskegon Democrat Poppy Sias-Hernandez after being locked in a vigorous and expensive fight down to the wire. Although with 73 percent of precincts reporting Mr. Bumstead only had 46.7 percent of the vote to Ms. Sias-Hernandez' 50.3 percent, a large portion of the remaining precincts were in conservative Newaygo County and Democrats were expecting the result to shift toward Mr. Bumstead.

Mr. Bumstead was expected to keep the Republican-leaning district in GOP hands with the help of significant Senate Republican campaign contributions, heavy advertising and extensive retail politics. Ms. Sias-Hernandez had similar backing from the Democrats in a dogfight of a race while building a strong brand for herself in the district, but it was not enough to get over the top.

**MIRS Analysis** (November 6, 2018): Former Rep. Jon BUMSTEAD, a longtime home construction contractor from the Newaygo area, gutted out a win over insurgent Democratic candidate Poppy SIAS-HERNANDEZ, with a strong performance in his home Newaygo County and nearby Oceana County.

The conservative Bumstead also survived a contentious Republican primary over deep-pocketed Rep. Holly HUGHES (R-Montague).

Sias-Hernandez had one of the more robust volunteer door-knocking armies this cycle as she connected with rural voters outside of her Muskegon base. Her team, at one point, included former Rep. Collene LAMONTE, the person Sias-Hernandez beat in the primary.
