


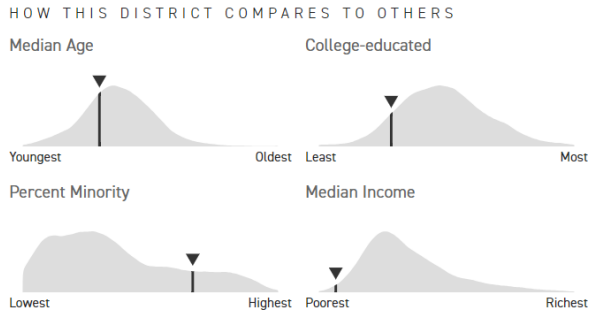

		<p>HOW THIS DISTRICT COMPARES TO OTHERS</p> <p>Median Age College-educated</p>  <p>MIRS Analysis (November 6, 2018): Democrats and Republicans will represent the same number for Michigan in the U.S. House in 2019-2020 after the Democratic nominee Haley STEVENS captured the 11th district, amid strong Democratic turnout statewide.</p> <p>Stevens, dubbed by President Barack OBAMA's auto rescue team as the effort's chief of staff roughly nine years ago, defeated Lena EPSTEIN, Trump's former campaign co-chair in Michigan in a western Wayne/Oakland County seat that has not been held by a Democrat under its current configuration.</p> <p>Stevens polled particularly well in Wayne County while Epstein wasn't able to make up enough ground in more rural areas of Oakland County, her association with Trump making her toxic in the district's more white-collar areas.</p> <p>Now-U.S. Sen. Gary PETERS represented significant parts of the district before it was redrawn and Peters' home was roped into the now-14th Congressional District with northern Detroit and Pontiac. It's currently represented by U.S. Rep. David TROTT (R-Birmingham), who is leaving after four years in office.</p>

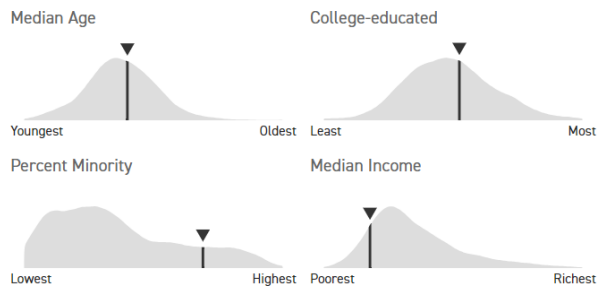

Ms. Polehanki, who was still teaching full-time during the campaign, was able to turn a lean-Republican district blue amidst an expensive final stretch for both parties.</p> <p>MIRS Analysis (November 6, 2018): House Appropriations Committee Chair Laura COX couldn't survive a bad environment for Republicans in western Wayne County and was defeated by Dayna POLEHANKI, a high school English teacher who also runs a television and film casting company.</p> <p>Cox, a former Wayne County commissioner, benefited from the endorsement of Democratic County Prosecutor Kym WORTHY and Executive Warren EVANS.
